- 1. Hospitality (chapter 53 of the Rule)
 - 53.1 All guests who present themselves are to be welcomed as Christ, for he himself will say: 'I was a stranger and you welcomed me' (Matt 25:35)
- 2. The formation of others
- 3. Prayer
- 4. Education
- 5. Living witness to an alternative reality—The Kingdom of God
